RE: :38 Special Police Positive Revolver.

Dear Sir:

With further reference to my recent memorandum concerning arms in use and to be used by the Bureau, I desire to submit for our record and for your possible future use, the following facts relative to the .38 Special Police Positive Revolver, already furnished to each field office of the Bureau. These facts are submitted for the reason that some field offices, Oklahoma City in particular, have requested :45 Automatic Pistols, and have inferred that the latter arm is superior to the one now in use by the Bureau. Such is not the case.

I tabulate below the ballistics of the two weapons:

/ .45 AUTOMATIC .38 SPECIAL 158 grams (1) Bullet weight - 200 grams 1125 foot seconds (2) Muzzle velocity - 910 foot seconds 444 foot lbs. (3) Energy - 368 foot lbs.

(4) Penetration in 8 inches (7/8 in. pine boards) - 8 inches

Even with a heavier bullet than the 200 gram bullet mentioned in the above tabulation, the :45 Automatic Pistol does not compare with the .38 Special. With a 230 gram bullet, the .45 Automatic has a muzzle velocity of only 809 foot seconds, an energy of only 335 foot seconds, and a penetration of only 7 inches. // RECORDED

pounds of energy may be procured from the Pistol now in use by the Bureau. However, it is to be noted that ordinary .38 Special ammunition, loaded with smokeless powder, gives better results than the best .45 Automatic Cartridge.
